A MILLAND woman has written her first book, and 50 per cent of her royalites will be donated to charity.

Vivien Gilliard has written Flight Home, and 25 per cent of the profits will be donated to Hounds for Heroes and another 25 per cent will be donated to Help for Heroes.

The book tells the wartime stories of John Philip Gregory and Emily Hale, al-

though Vivien admitted that she stumbled across the story by accident.

She said: "We adulthood' were clearing up some belongings and we found some letters, and that started the research because I was fascinated by the content of the letters.

"I went to Cornwall to do

some research and I went to Holland in 1999 for research, so I have been working on this for a long time."

John fought in the war. while Emily became a Wren and met John at Defford. Worcestershire.

"The most emotional letter was the one that John was told to write on D-Day by the ministry because they expected huge losses," said Vivien.

"The book follows John. from his birth up to the end of the Second World War.
